Fulfilling the potential of **person-centred** digital technologies for integrated care and support services across the lifespan.

A Carefull Europe will protect and enhance supports and services for people who need them, while also knowing that good services alone are not enough for a good life - people need to live in neighbourhoods and communities that provide connection, participation and meaning, and an opportunity to care about and for each other.



Care should be person-centred and conducive to independent living, integrating long-term care and healthcare, informal care, home care, community-based and residential care. (European Commission)



Integrated care should be Comprehensive, Equitable, Sustainable, Coordinated, Continuous, Holistic, Preventive, Empowering, Goal oriented, Respectful, Collaborative, Coproduced, Evidence-informed, led by whole-systems thinking, and based on Ethical practice with careful use of technology to also protect people (World Health Organisation)










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Research and policy already show that key enablers are being:



Care should benefit from the 4th industrial revolution using accessible technology and digital innovations to support autonomy and independent living, as a way to align the offer of long-term care services to long-term care needs, and supporting the freedom of choice, and participation in decision-making of people (European Council)
